

Do you Qualify?

Eligible participants:

- Have a new criminal case or probation revocation pending in the 4th JD
- Are probation eligible

**Eligibility requirements vary among programs. Certain high level felonies, sex offenses, or violent crimes do not qualify for all problem solving courts.

See if you're eligible!

Speak with your attorney, public defender, or probation officer to see if you're eligible. Request to attend a briefing, orientation, or problem solving court docket to learn more.

Please Note:

Those qualifying for problem solving courts are not automatically accepted and must complete multiple assessments prior to acceptance. Eligibility does not guarantee entry into the program.

An Alternative to Prison

Problem-Solving Courts are designed to keep participants out of CJC and the Department of Corrections long-term. They offer treatment, guidance, and solutions to increase accountability and reduce future criminal behaviors among high risk/high need individuals.

Problem-Solving Court programs utilize a collaborative multidisciplinary team of professionals who provide focused supervision and individualized treatment plans for eligible parties.

Problem-Solving and Specialty Courts:

- Save taxpayer money
- Reunite families
- Build resiliency
- Reduce future criminal activity
- Promote skills building
- Prevent jail time
- Reduce substance use

Our Programs

If you are struggling with drug or alcohol use, domestic violence offenses, or trauma from military service and have new charges or a pending probation revocation, you may qualify for one of these programs:

Have you been struggling with substance use disorder?

Consider Recovery Court

Recovery Court is a program for high risk defendants with substance use disorders (as determined by a clinical assessment) which caused or influenced their criminal behavior. Participants have many types of felony convictions, including DF4s and other non-violent, drug-related or drug-motivated felonies.

Do you have new felony DUI charge or are you facing probation revocation for a DUI case?

Consider Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Court

DUI Court participants have been convicted of a felony level DUI.

Have you been arrested 2+ times for domestic violence and have one prior DV conviction?

Consider Domestic Violence (DV) Court

Domestic Violence Court participants have been arrested multiple times for domestic violence offenses or have a single DV charge requiring increased accountability and supervision.

Have you served in the military & have a service connected trauma?

Consider Veterans Trauma Court (VTC)

The VTC program assists those who have served. Participants often live with PTSD, traumatic brain injuries, depression, anxiety, substance use disorder, and other disorders following their service.

These and other specialty courts are intensive and may require regular treatment for substance use, mental health disorders, and other concerns as well as frequent court interaction, mandatory drug testing, and continuous probation supervision.
